I would like to thank all Past Potentates, Nobles, Shrine Ladies, friends and family who have helped Lady Peggy and me become Potentate and First Lady of Korein Temple. This is an honor many do not get. It is an honor to serve this Nobility and respective Masonic family.

We are charged to not only take care of each other in our Masonic obligation, but as Shriners we are charged to take care of innocent children who may or may not have a Masonic heritage. We do not know the impact we, as Shriners, make on the world. Eight or so years ago, on May 5, I took a launch off a horse that broke my pelvis in four places and shattered my hip so much that the doctor in Cheyenne referred to it as Grape Nuts. They sent me directly to the hospital in Denver. The doctor explained he was one of two surgeons in the area that could do the type of surgery that I needed, to which I replied, "great doc, but I need to be ready by Frontier Days." He asked me why and when it was. I told him when it was and what it was and that I was one of the Shrine Clowns who have led the parade for years and I did not want to miss it. He laughed and said he did his internship at the Shrine Hospital in Minnesota and loved what we do. My surgery was delayed for a day and they had one team work on my hip with the other working on my pelvis. After all of the follow

up visits and at my last one I told the doctor that I had not received a bill from him or anything outside the hospital room, medicine etc He told me he and the other surgeon talked about it and he told me to keep doing what we are doing for the children and not to worry about it. Needless to say, this has had a severe impact on me. I came home and directed my family to always pay my Blue Lodge dues and my Shrine dues. I am not a Shrine kid; however, I am a Shrine adult as I received a benefit from what we do.

As Imperial says, we must find "Just One." We all need to go out and help to find, Just One to come into Masonry. We need to work with ALL of the Masonic bodies to find Just One. There are 2550 Masons in Wyoming. In Scottish Rite there are roughly 1126 members, which comes in at 44 percent. York Rite has 506, or 20 percent. We have 492 Korein Shriners and 561 Kalif, or 1053 Shriners, or roughly 41 percent. If we all looked to improve the Blue Lodge numbers and increased the number statewide by 100, we would gain 41 new Shriners. Even the oldest of us can make a difference. When I went to the mall and wore my baseball cap with the Scimitar, I did not get a look, however, when I went back 2 minutes later wearing my fez,

Patient from 1950s never forgets time at Shriners Hospitals for Children - Salt Lake City

This is the story of the six months that changed my life forever thanks to the Shriners and all of the wonderful people at the Shriners hospital.

When I began walking, I was quite pigeon-toed so my parents took me to a local doctor who prescribed corrective shoes; however, my condition only worsened. One of my uncles knew a Shriner who connected me with the Shriners Hospitals for Children in Chicago.

At the age of 4, I began visiting the Chicago location. The doctor explained the problem was actually in my hips and prescribed a different type of corrective shoes and gave me exercises to do. Over the next eight years, my annual visits were encouraging as I was doing better; however, I still did not walk correctly.

Since my family had moved from Indiana to Greeley, Colorado, when I was in the seventh grade, my records were transferred to the Salt Lake City Shriners Hospital for my annual checkup that summer.

After examining me, the doctor informed my parents that my condition would probably not improve. My heart sank. He went on to suggest that surgery could correct my walking if I wanted it. Having experienced embarrassing comments from junior high boys, I would do anything to be able to walk correctly.

On October 11, 1957, my mother and I took the train to Salt Lake City and I was admitted to Shriners Hospital. Thanks

to the Daughters of the Nile, I was provided with a new dress to wear.

A week later, I had my first surgery on my left leg, followed by a hip spica cast. Seven weeks later another surgery was performed on my right leg and the cast was extended so that it started from above my waist to my toes on both legs with a bar attached to my lower legs, which could be used to lift me.

For a week after surgery, I attended school in bed. The classroom was in the hall between the girls and boys wards and with one teacher for students in grades 3-8. I loved the opportunity to work on my own and actually completed the eighth grade curriculum in six months.

A week after surgery, the physical therapist provided me with a specially designed wheelchair since I couldn't sit upright. It was great to be mobile!

After school and on the weekends we had occupational therapy, which was craft projects that included making a wooden shelf for knick-knacks, ceramic items and more. There were weekly classes for the girls to learn how to embroider and for the older kids, bead work. Various volunteers gave us ukulele lessons and had us play musical instruments for a rhythm band.

Once a month we watched a movie. On Saturday evenings, we watched TV for an hour. Sunday evenings we had devotionals with inspiring speakers and then returned to our wards singing, *Now the Day is Over*, which I still sing to myself each night as I fall to sleep. Shriner clowns, musicians and

many other groups also entertained us. I don't remember ever being bored.

Since I didn't have a sister, I really enjoyed being in a ward with about 10 other girls. What a learning experience to meet children who had survived polio but now had to learn to walk again! One of the boys had been in an accident and was paralyzed from his waist down. I soon realized how fortunate I was.

Christmas was a special time as we had entertainment nearly every evening. We put on a Christmas play for the Shriners and then for our parents.

On Christmas day, Santa arrived with laundry carts filled with a big bag for each patient with about 10 gifts provided by the Shriners and two gifts from home. Wow!

In February, my cast was removed and I quickly learned that you don't spend four months in a cast and then get up and walk the next day. The physical therapist was encouraging and taught me the importance of perseverance. To strengthen my legs, I made a rug with a weaving loom with foot pedals.

On April 4, which was Good Friday, I had the Best Friday because my mother arrived and I was able to walk out of Shriners Hospital with my toes pointing straight ahead.

Not only had my walking improved, but I had also developed more self-confidence, a positive attitude about life and had witnessed compassion and dedication in action.

The 47th Annual Shrine Bowl All Star Football Game is coming soon!


I know at this time of year everyone seems to get hit up for either money to support various activities; or for you to spend time helping in clubs, the Temple or Lodge.

Former Mexican Shrine Patient Now A Doctor

Daniela, from Juarez, Mexico, first became a patient at Shriners Hospitals for Children — Salt Lake City when she was 4 months old. Born with fibular hemimelia, missing the fibula in her right leg, her family made the decision to amputate her right leg below the knee at 9 months.

“From that moment,” said Daniela, “Shriners Hospitals for Children and all the staff members became a support system for me. They made me feel like I could become whatever I set my mind to.” Daniela describes her experience at the Salt Lake City Shriners Hospital as so much more than receiving medical care. Her emotional well-being was also looked after throughout her medical journey.

Daniela has had several surgeries, benefited from physical therapy and prosthetic legs over the years, and always looked forward to reconnecting with the staff she knows and loves at her annual visits. But the opportunity that provided the most impact on her was attending the annual summer and winter Un-Limb-ited teen amputee camps. “Those trips helped me come to terms with my condition and truly accept it, and, needless to say, have lots of fun,”

said Daniela.

Her mother will never forget that first year of camp. When she picked her up from the airport, she asked Daniela how her experience was. Daniela responded that for the first time in her life she was able to be herself. “Every year was memorable,” Daniela said. “But ever since the first time, I definitely enjoyed truly being myself and not having to hide any aspect from my life. I didn’t have to worry about any judgment or stares.” Up to that point, Daniela always chose the appearance of her prosthesis to be flesh color, but after her first camp she wanted to make her prosthetic legs as colorful as possible. “Because there’s no point in hiding something I can’t change!” said Daniela. “I’m very grateful to Shriners Hospital for giving me the chance to accept and love myself.”

Daniela was greatly impacted by all of her orthopaedic surgeons, who she felt always gave their best efforts. She is incredibly grateful for their knowledge and experience. “Because of them,” said Daniela, “I am able to participate in so many activities that I once believed were impossible – walking, riding a bike, running and

playing sports.”

As Daniela considered her career, drawing from years of experience as a patient at Shriners Hospitals for Children, she decided she wanted to pursue medicine. “I met so many people, staff and other patients. All of them motivated me in some way to pursue the medical career, which I find myself in now. I was inspired by all of the physicians in charge of my care. They showed me the impact I can have on the patients when you are passionate and devoted to this profession.”

Daniela completed medical school in 2017 and is now practicing medicine as a general practitioner physician in Sonora, Mexico. She takes the residency exam in September to start her journey towards becoming an orthopaedic surgeon.

Daniela encourages Mexican families who have children with orthopaedic needs to seek out Shriners Hospitals for Children for care. “I think families from Mexico should know that they cannot choose better physicians for their kids,” said Daniela. “Sometimes it will be a slow and tough process, but trust the doctors and take advantage of the care they offer.”

Masonic Trivia

The most famous Volume of Sacred Law in Freemasonry is a 1767 King James version of the Bible that belongs to St. John's Lodge #1 in New York City. Founded in 1757, the Lodge was destroyed by fire in 1770. To replace the destroyed Lodge Bible, Master Jonathan Hampton presented St John's with a heavy altar Bible printed by Mark Baskett, a London printer.

The nine pound Bible contains one hundred and three steel engravings of illustrations by John Stuart. The deep red Moroccan leather covers are latched with a matched pair of silver clasps.

On April 30th, 1789, New York Governor and Grand Master Robert R. Livingston stood in New York City Hall prepared to swear George Washington into office as President of the United States. When Livingston requested a Bible, none was to be

A few years later, he bought me boots for hiking, which I would never have thought of doing before eighth grade. I have since hiked to the bottom of the Grand Canyon and to the top of Pikes Peak. To me, those events are symbolic of my great life.

had. Jacob Morton, the Worshipful Master of St. John's, offered to dash to the nearby Lodge and bring their Lodge Bible.

When the Bible arrived, Livingston opened it at random to Genesis 49:13, Washington placed his left palm on the right hand page and was sworn into office.

Four other Presidents have used this Bible for their swearing in ceremonies: Warren G. Harding, Dwight D. Eisenhower, Jimmy Carter and George H.W. Bush. George W. Bush had planned to use the Bible in 2001, but the risk of rain damage prevented its use. The Bible has been used in funeral observances for George Washington, Andrew Jackson, Zachary Taylor and Abraham Lincoln. On July 4th, 1992, the Bible was used when the USS George Washington, nuclear super carrier CVN-73, was commissioned.

On December 4th, 1783, General George Washington gave his famous farewell address to his officers in Faunces Tavern. On September 11th, 2001, the St. John's Bible was on loan in an exhibit at Faunces Tavern Museum, when terrorists attacked the World Trade Center nearby. It was two days before the Bible could be recovered under a special security escort.



Both Masonic and anti-Masonic conspiracy theorists oftentimes cite that President Ronald Reagan was a Freemason.

He wasn't.

The confusion arises from a ceremony that took place in the Oval Office on February 11th, 1988.

Grand Master Raymond

McMullen of the District of Columbia presented the President with a "Certificate of Honor." According to the certificate, Reagan's life was a testament to the Masonic principles of Brotherly Love, Relief and Truth. This certificate should not be confused with a Grand Master making a man a Mason-at-Sight.

Also present at the ceremony were Sovereign Grand Commander Francis Paul of the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction of Scottish Rite and Sovereign Grand Commander C. Fred Kleinknecht of the Southern Jurisdiction of Scottish Rite, who jointly presented Reagan with a diploma that "Conferred the title of Honorary Scottish Rite Mason" on the President.

Imperial Potentate Voris King presented a framed certificate to the President that made him an "Honorary Member of the Imperial Council of AAONMS.

Reagan attended and participated in both Scottish Rite and Shrine events as President, but was never admitted into a Blue Lodge of Masons.



Many Lodges have made due with locations that were thrust upon them by circumstances of history and geography. Other Lodges, like Lodge #239 of Paris, France, have embraced the novelty of remote locations.

On August 23rd, 1879, the Lodge met for the initiation of a new Brother. The place was Paris, France. The degree was not exactly conferred "in" the city, but 500 feet above Paris in a hot air balloon by 3 officers and the candidate. Remaining Brothers stood on the ground below the balloon.
